The Empowering Womxn of Color Conference (EWOCC) was founded in 1985 by a group of undergraduate students at the University of California, Berkeley as their semester project for a DE-Cal (Democratic Education at Cal) class. The project, entitled "Women of Color in the United States," received an overwhelmingly positive response, and students decided to organize another event with the help of the Graduate Assembly (GA), Berkeley's graduate student government. Today, EWOCC is one of the longest running conferences in the nation to present women of color with an opportunity to address the racial, class, and gender issues facing women of color. The conference is open to all women* of all ages.

*EWOCC uses womxn/women to describe all who experience life through the lens of womxn/women in body, spirit, identity past, present, future and fluid.




NAVIGATION

Take the AX staircase or elevator to the 3rd floor to Pauley Ballroom, Kerr Lobby, and Stephens Lounge.




The West Pauley Patio is a dedicated Decompression Area. All are welcome to step outside, as needed.



The Wakan Wiya Two Spirit Drum was founded by Indigenous Two Spirit women in the Bay Area with the manda to support Two Spirit Indigiqueer TG/GNC LGBTQIA+ communities, their families, friends and allies. We support the return of Two Spirit peoples to Indigenous drum traditions where healing medicina is for all.

The Wakan Wiya Two Spirit Drum is the Drum in Residence at Xochicalli-House of Flowers: IndigeQueer Medicine and Healing, a community organization dedicated to creating spaces centering IndigeQueer community and offering BIPOC TG/GNC LGBQIA+ ancestral healing programming.

Sogorea Te' Land Trust

Sogorea Te' Land Trust is an urban Indigenous women-led land trust based in the San Francisco Bay Area that facilitates the return of Indigenous land to Indigenous people.

Berkeley sits in the territory of Xučyun.

The Empowering Womxn of Color Conference recognizes that UC Berkeley sits on the territory of xučyun (Huichin), the original landscape of the Chochenyo speaking Ohlone people, the successors of the sovereign Verona Band of Alameda County.

This region continues to be of great importance to the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and other familial descendants of the Verona Band. We recognize that every member of the Berkeley community has, and continues to benefit from, the use and occupation of this land, since the institution's founding in 1868. Consistent with our values of community, inclusion and diversity, we have a responsibility to acknowledge and make visible the university's relationship to Native peoples.

As members of the Berkeley and Bay Area community, it is vitally important that we not only recognize the history of the land on which we stand, but also, we recognize that the Muwekma Ohlone people are alive and flourishing members of the Berkeley and broader Bay Area communities today.

MORNING WORKSHOPS

Wakan Wiya Two Spirit Drum Healing Drum Circle Location: Pauley Ballroom

All are invited to circle up and put down tobacco prayers and intentions for our beloved communities and families! We are unveiling our visions for this year's Spring and the seeds we have planted and tend to together. At the drum we conjure for ourselves and our communities, we move medicine for and with each other. We invite you to join IndigeQueer BIPOC community in this time we make for ourselves to dream and vision our wellness, all under these skies here in Huichiun, land of the Confederated Villages of the Lisjan Ohlone. Healing Drum Circles with the Wakan Wiya Two Spirit Drum and drumkeeper Zamora are a chance to tap into collective healing/prayer/ meditation work through the heartbeat.

Roots Restored: Reconnecting Family on the Path to Freedom Location: Stephens Lounge

Family is where we first learn connection, trust, and love, but it's also where unresolved patterns and pain can take root. Roots Restored invites you to embark on a healing journey to strengthen these foundational ties. This transformative workshop is designed to help individuals and families rediscover their bonds, heal generational wounds, and foster authentic connection. Through a blend of guided introspection, interactive activities, and actionable tools, participants will explore the roots of family dynamics, break free from limiting patterns, and rebuild relationships with love, understanding, and freedom at their core.

Living in Color: Tools for BIPOC Women to Manage Stress in Uncertain Times Location: Tilden Lounge

Nina Simone, in her song "You've Got to Learn," advised, "you've got to learn to leave the table when love's no longer being served. Taking care of yourself means knowing when to walk away from toxic situations." In these tumultuous and uncertain times, self-care is essential for BIPOC women. The compounding effects of political turmoil, systemic racism, and social inequality place an immense burden on the mental, emotional, and social well-being of women of color.

This workshop aims to provide practical tools and strategies for BIPOC women to manage stress in an increasingly unpredictable world. This workshop will empower participants to cultivate resilience, enhance self-care, and foster mental well-being in the face of adversity. Participants will engage in activities that help them practice self-care routines, develop practical tools for stress management, and learn how to cultivate strength during difficult times. Such activities will include meditation and relaxation techniques, interactive exercises, and activities that foster movement and connection.

MORNING WORKSHOPS

Embodying Self-Determination: A Somatic Writing Workshop on Love and Liberation for Women, Femme and Nonbinary Organizers Location: BNorth 82A

This experiential workshop seeks to create a space that allows women, femmes and nonbinary folks to name and engage with the unique challenges faced in movement spaces. Together participants will explore "self-determination" as a part of movement building and an antidote. Participants will learn and have an opportunity to practice somatic skills that support embodied dignity and vision a fully liberated existence in movement spaces.

Participants will be guided through somatic exploration and writing prompts to support an embodied exploration and understanding of what it means to orient towards dignity and self determination as a north star to guide their journeys through leading in movement space.





From Follicles to Toenails Location: BNorth 82D

For hundreds of years, "From Follicles to Toenails" women of color bodied humans have been under attack, removed from our cultural practices and conditioned to view ourselves by European beauty standards. Western society has continued to systematically implement ineffective preventative care, healing modalities and treatments that do not align physically mentally or spiritually. With a focus on nature as our provider, "From Follicles to Toenails" is a discussion led, information based self-care workshop addressing the cosmetic products we commonly use that cause us (intentional?) harm. A safe space dedicated to initiate healing, participants will be encouraged to share their experiences, engage with one another and gain knowledge about practical ways to care for their own hair, skin and nails. Not only will individuals learn about simple, inexpensive and effective rituals that can be incorporated into daily life, they will also have the opportunity to create tangible products to take home. The stereotypes, let's talk about it. The commodified ways that our bodies are suppressed, let's talk about it. How beautiful we are from "Follicles to Toenails", let's talk about it. After we talk about it, let's take back our power and make some magic today. We can smash the system one follicle, one hair, one pore, one nail at a time.

Ericka Huggins Human Rights Activist, Poet, and Scholar

Ericka Huggins is a human rights activist, poet, educator, Black Panther leader and former political prisoner. For the past 30 years, she has lectured throughout the United States and internationally. Her extraordinary life experiences have enabled her to speak personally and eloquently on issues relating to the physical and emotional well-being of women, children and youth, whole being education, over incarceration, and the role of the spiritual practice in sustaining activism and promoting change.

Ericka is the co-author of two books, Insights and Poems (1974) and Comrade Sister: Women of the Black Panther Party (2022). Her biography, Black Panther Woman: The Political and Spiritual Life of Ericka Huggins was published in January 2025.

Gretchen Carvajal is an interdisciplinary Filipina artist from the Bay Area. She currently works as a teaching artist at the leading youth spoken word organization in the world, Youth Speaks, teaching high school spoken word at local San Francisco public schools. When she's not in the classroom, she designs, manufactures, and promotes her laser-cut earring brand BRWNGRLZ. When she's not making earrings, she's making prints, bending neon, or making films.



Gretchen's work revolves around her journey as an immigrant who came to the US at the age of 7. Her different art forms (printmaking, neon, film, poetry, jewelry) serve as languages that are able to convey her story past the tongue she was born with and the language she was forced to learn. When she's not hustling multiple jobs/art forms to sustain living in the ever-gentrifying Bay Area, she's talking about love or astrology, listening to I'm Still In Love With You by Sean Paul, taking care of her 5-year-old niece Leila, and cooking extremely large meals for her family.

Ariana Lee (she/her/她) Youth Speaks Public Poet

PUBLIC

Ariana Lee is a Taiwanese and Chinese American writer from Houston, TX. She is the 2022-2023 Houston Youth Poet Laureate and two-time member of Meta4 Houston, the #1 ranked youth slam poetry team at Brave New Voices 2023 (the first Houston team to win the title).

A YoungArts winner in both poetry and spoken word, Lee has opened for U.S. Poet Laureate Ada Limón and performed original work for NASA; Stop AAPI Hate; the NCAA Men's Final Four Legacy Project presented by Degree; the Aspen Institute; the Houston Mayor's Office, and more. She has collaborated with and performed for Get Lit - Words Ignite, The Battery SF, Children's Museum Houston, Anderson Collection at Stanford University.

As a 2022-2023 Youth Fellow for the International Human Rights Art Movement, she curated an international, multimedia anthology highlighting youth voices and international solidarity.

Pte San Win Little Whiteman Youth Speaks Public Poet



Pte San Win Little Whiteman is an Oglala Lakota poet who uses poetry for advocacy and healing. Most of their poetry highlights mental health awareness, environmental, racial, and social justice, land/body relationships, and language revitalization. They are Brave New Voices alumni and have experience performing on stages such as The Kennedy Center, Native Pop, Black Hills Artist Market, and Poetry Out Loud. They were interviewed for Teen Vogue and Indian Country Today, and they won a publication with the Tribal College Journal for AIHEC's creative writing contest in August 2023. Pte San Win is a youth coordinator for NDN Girls Book Club and has experience facilitating writing workshops, poetry slams, and open mics. They hope to inspire others to read, write, and perform poetry as it is an act of oral and aural tradition. A practice that has kept many cultures alive today.

Berna Anat Financial Educator and Hypewoman

Berna Anat (@heyberna) is an award-winning author, producer, speaker, co-founder, rich auntie in training, and Financial Hype Woman—which is her made-up way of saying she creates financial education media for young BIPOC. A proud Filipina-American daughter of immigrants, she taught herself how to pay off over \$50,000 of debt and did what any Millennial would do: Yell about it on the internet.



Berna's 2023 debut book with HarperCollins, MONEY OUT LOUD: All the Financial Stuff No One Taught Us, is a Bookshop.org Bestseller and has received starred reviews from Kirkus and Booklist. Berna is the co-founder and Head of Community and Culture at New Dimes, a network for first-generation breadwinners moving past stability to generate wealth and make progressive change.

Christine R. Melendres, LCSW CEO and Founder of Sweet Mango Therapy Group

Christine R. Melendres, LCSW, is the Founder of Sweet Mango Therapy Group, Inc., a psychotherapy group practice dedicated to serving the Filipina/x/o and AAPI community. With a BA in Sociology from UC Berkeley and an MSW from San Francisco State University, Christine specializes in empowering Filipina and AAPI women through culturally responsive, trauma-informed care. A Certified Brainspotting Therapist, she addresses issues such as burnout, anxiety, depression, trauma, and imposter syndrome. As the Bay Area Chapter Lead for Therapinay and a board member of the Filipino Young Leaders Program (FYLPRO), Christine advocates for mental health and wellness within the Filipinx community.

Kyra Lumpkin is a third-generation perfumer with over 20 years of aroma chemical experience. Growing up, Kyra Lumpkin lived in pretty much every major city in the United States. "I had to make peace with the idea that home was not going to be a place for me," says Lumpkin. "It was always going to be an ideal or set of people or a moment in time. Sylvia L. Blalock is no stranger to the Empowering Womxn of Color conference. Sylvia has been a committee member for EWOCC as well as workshop presenter, open mic performer, Theme artist and audio-visual coordinator. Sylvia was empowered by her experiences with EWOCC to make a pivot on her own trajectory.



In 2020, she fired her job and launched Queendom Network, in an effort to utilize her skills as a graphic designer and writer to bring women and paying projects together. She has provided opportunities for poets, artists, musicians, chefs and more through coordinating meetups, interviewing people live on her show, Poetry in the Raw or otherwise facilitating connection. Sylvia considers the Empowering Womxn of Color Conference to be one of the most cherished and pivotal events of every year she has attended.

Sylvia Blalock is a student at Diablo Valley College, pursuing a degree in Business Administration. She is the owner of Queendom.Network and the author of "Uprising: A book of Poetry". When not planning for the next chapter of life with her husband and business partner, Stevan Edgecombe, she works on building community alliances and artistic opportunities for resistance.

AFTERNOON WORKSHOPS

Zine Zen: A Self-Discovery Zine-making Journey Location: Pauley Ballroom

In this workshop participants will design an 8-page handmade zine centered on self-affirmation. They will combine personal poetry, favorite song lyrics, inspiration quotes and collaged visuals to craft a unique narrative that expresses their inner journey.



Liberatory Biomimicry: a practice to escape oppression and reclaim your power as a living system Location: Stephens Lounge

In this engaging, interactive workshop participants will use the Unleashing Aliveness Liberatory Practices Card Deck to explore Liberatory Practices that subvert, undermine, replace, and heal white supremacy cultural characteristics and oppressive practices (such as perfectionism, urgency, and imposter syndrome). Then, through powerful group coaching with an expert, participants will build the confidence to use the deck at home or at work to claim their personal liberation and become even more effective catalysts for collective liberation. This workshop is best suited to those familiar with antioppression concepts inlcuding Social Identity, Intersectionality, and The 4 I's of Oppression.

Rooted Resistance: Ecofeminist Resistance, Decolonial Healing, and Climate Justice Location: Tilden Lounge

The climate crisis disproportionately impacts women of color, and the burden of activism often falls on those most affected. This workshop creates space to reflect on this weight while also honoring the unique perspectives, knowledge, and resilience that come with it. Through discussions, healing exercises, guided reflection, and case studies of women of color eco-activists, we will examine how colonialism and capitalism shape our relationships with land and each other. Drawing from ancestral ecofeminism, queer theory, and decolonial thought, we will explore ways to heal our environmental relationships and sustain ourselves in the struggle for justice. Participants will leave with tools to reimagine environmentalism beyond extraction and exhaustion — toward a practice of collective care, resistance, and renewal.

AFTERNOON WORKSHOPS

We Grieve Different: Healing through Writing and Creativity Location: BNorth 82A

'We Grieve Different' is a workshop that provides practices, resources, and tools to help Women of Color navigate through grief. Death, grief, and mourning can be very isolating, but also a time where support is needed most. Through music, writing, and collaging, we will explore ways to hold space for our grief. With grace and creativity, we will learn and share impactful tools to tangibly, and creatively navigate grief as a community.

Art as Healing: Creating for Self-Care and Connection Location: BNorth 82D

This hands-on workshop invites participants to explore art as a therapeutic tool for self-expression, emotional release, and healing. Designed with simplicity and accessibility in mind, this session focuses on cost-effective materials and techniques that anyone can use to create art for personal growth and self-care. Participants will engage in reflective and creative activities while learning how to integrate art into their daily routines as a powerful method for mindfulness and connection.

Closing Limpia Circle with Napaquetzalli

Napaquetzalli is an indigenous healer and herbalist of Yaqui/Purepecha descent. She grew up in Southern California in a family of artists devoted to their ancestral practices. Being raised in a ceremonial way of life, Napaquetzalli has always been deeply in tune to her intuitive connection to spirit and nature. Napa has continued her studies of curanderismo and indigenous healing through the Ancestral Apothecary school in Oakland, CA, as well as training with renowned traditional healer Doña Enriqueta Contreras in Oaxaca, Mexico. She is a co-founder or Curanderas Sin Fronteras, a collective that provides wellness services to Latinx communities in the Bay Area and beyond. She studied Western herbalism at the California School of Herbal Studies in 2016 and has worked in herbal apothecaries for many years, most currently as a clinical herbalist and teacher at the Scarlet Sage Herb Co. in San Francisco. Napaquetzalli is committed to providing culturally relevant and accessible medicine to her communities and helping folks reconnect to intuitive and ancestral knowledge as a source of guidance. Her practice is rooted in self-healing as a method to decolonize our relationships to the earth, our bodies and each other.





Drumkeeper M. Zamora is a Chicana, Yoeme (Yaqui) and Tongva Two Spirit feminist educator and community organizer. Their ancestors come from the Los Angeles Basin and northern Mexico's Sonora and Chihuahua regions. They served as ceremonial singer/drumkeeper in their Two Spirit community for over 18 years. Zamora has led several drums, and brought the Wakan Wiya Two Spirit Drum to Casa Tia Luna in 2020 where it is now the drum in-residence. Zamora has taught Ethnic Studies, Chicana/o Latina/o Studies, and Gender Studies and Feminist Theory at California State University East Bay, University of San Francisco and Stanford University.

Crystal Bolton

Crystal Bolton is an Oakland native, a homeschooling mother of two, CEO/Founder of Nubian-KreativGoddess LLC and a passionate Spiritual Transformation Coach. She has answered the call of her ancestors by guiding women through profound healing journeys that foster self-awareness. Her mission is clear and impactful: breaking generational cycles, overcoming addictions, healing trauma, and empowering women to B.O.S.S. UP—Build On Self Sustainability. Crystal is committed to transforming lives and creating lasting change in her community.

Maiya Lanae Evans

Maiya Lanae Evans, MPH is a health educator, entrepreneur, and consultant. Much of her work examines the intersection between holistic health, public health, and social justice. She currently teaches courses in public health and holistic health at San Francisco State University and Skyline College, and was a 2020-2021 EPIC fellow at Stanford University. In addition to her work as a health educator, Maiya is a facilitator and consultant for the anti-racism organization, The Mosaic Project. From 2019-2023 Maiya was on a research team and was a mindfulness educator for SFBUILD, an NIH-funded organization that works to enhance diversity of the biomedical research workforce at San Francisco State University. Sylvia Gin (She/They) Catering Committee


